



Chairperson Report

The past season was a consolidation of the growth in cricket over the previous year.

Representative results at all levels were mixed, but strong participation playing numbers made for healthy competition for places in the representative sides. The results and team performances are recorded elsewhere in the report.

Cricket administration was very effective and well spread throughout the Association, both for internal competitions in the Association and coaching of all groups and teams of players.

The Basil Netten Indoor Centre was an integral part of the administration, being the Association's headquarters, and for the all-year-round training options that it gives to our cricketers.

The annual awards night was again a very successful evening to acknowledge all involved in cricket, and my congratulations to all winners and thanks to all those coaches, parents and volunteers who tirelessly support the game.

Revenue improved on the previous year allowing further employment opportunity for management and coaching within the organisation. Representative fixtures, tournaments and cricket hosting were the principal expenses for the year, reflecting the Board's desire to create as many opportunities as possible for cricket. A healthy surplus was generated, allowing a build-up of the Association's reserves.

During the year the Board undertook a governance training programme which was substantially completed by Board members centred around the duties and responsibilities of Board members. It was a very useful course, and I believe it assisted in upskilling all members to be able to more fully conduct and understand their roles within the Board of the Association.

Further development at Donnelly Park facilities took place in conjunction with the Horowhenua District Council; and the five-year programme will see an enhanced facility capable of hosting first class cricket at the ground. The Basil Netten Indoor Centre is nearing completion, and ongoing work should see that come to fruition this coming season.

My thanks to David O'Brien and his staff, and all involved for their contribution in the delivery of cricket in our region.

Chief Executive Report

It is with pride I present my Chief Executive report for the Horowhenua Kapiti Cricket Association. The closing of this period ends my third financial year in the role. I reflect on the past 12 months and feel extremely proud of what has been achieved throughout our district. I continue to be excited about the direction we are heading and what still can be accomplished as we continue to deliver on our strategic priorities. As a district we collectively display a healthy can-do attitude, this mindset has allowed us to be courageous and challenge ourselves to reach new heights this past year.

The execution of the priorities identified by New Zealand Cricket during the "One Cricket" review will provide our team with a renewed focus in areas of governance, improving and growing the capabilities of our district coaches along with new reporting requirements to Central Districts. This will all be formalized in a Network Partnership Agreement with HKCA, CD and NZC. The agreement will guide us through the first year of the four-year master agreement.

We highlighted last year the need to improve our junior cricket offering and I am pleased to report we successfully transitioned junior cricket back under HK administration. A huge project undertaken by many with the pursuing result being the birth of HKCA Cubs Junior Cricket. We grew junior playing numbers by an amazing 250%. I thank the families for trusting us and for providing continued support throughout the project. A significant financial contribution from HK to our Clubs was also achieved this season, the grant was to assist the clubs in helping them provide a quality environment for our junior players.

Calculated investment in our facilities has continued to benefit our members and provided us with opportunities to host National fixtures at Donnelly Park this season. This hadn't been achieved in HK for over 15 years and now provides a new high-level spectator offering. Over 500 spectators turning up to a Central Hinds vs Wellington Blaze T20 in November shows the decision makers above we are a district willing to support our game.

Our HK staff continue to champion their areas of influence and their efforts must be applauded. Our Board led by John Fluker have again been highly supportive to the operational team. The Board have also embarked on upskilling with many directors completing formal governance training, a positive sign for the future.

I would also like to acknowledge the tireless number of hours our growing volunteer base puts into making HKCA a better place. We have an amazing group of people willing to step up and help us achieve more.

Community Cricket

As you will see throughout further reports the birth of HKCA Cubs Junior Cricket has to be one of the most

rewarding projects successfully delivered this year. We have linked everyone back into what was a messy junior offering. We can comfortably now say that if you are a junior within the Horowhenua Kapiti you have an opportunity to play cricket without the barriers of hours of travel. The collaboration with our established clubs has been instrumental in the success of this project, the clubs see a huge benefit of having young players and their families joining their club early. This will in time help provide some long-term player sustainability for our clubs.

Pathway to the Black Caps and White Ferns



Developments continued this year at Donnelly Park with the facilities receiving more investment from the

Levin Cricket Foundation. Upstairs changing rooms and an umpire room that meet NZC WOF requirements will be completed before season 2018-19 commences. HK were successful with an HDC Long Term Plan submission which will see another \$250,000 be spent on improvements at Donnelly Park over the next three years. Improvements include outdoor training nets, Mobile Nets, additional strips on Donnelly 5, New

four strip grass block at the park, picket fencing and a transportable electronic scoreboard the relaying of the Weraroa Block was also included and is scheduled for 2021. The Donnelly 5 Block also received a comprehensive relay with Patumahoe Clay after the season finished this year which will also help improve the cricketing experience for all.

This season we had the largest number of HK members represent Central District for a long time. Ryan McCone (Weraroa C.C) received a Stags contract, Fraser Bartholomew (Levin Old Boys) and Kelsey Fahey (Paraparaumu C.C) both were selected for the CD U19s, Fraser also participated in an invitational CD side that played fixtures against Afghanistan and India U19 sides in December. Dylan Reder (Paraparaumu C.C) was selected in the CD U17s and Zoe Yeo and Ayesha Carly Hendry were selected in the CD U15 Girls team with Ayesha given the captaincy.

Former Levin Old Boys and HK representative Matthew Bacon also received a First-Class contract with the Otago Volts.



Financial and Governance Success

The board identifying and undertaking formal upskilling opportunities has been a positive for the year. With all

members registering for the Governance 101 for Cricket course offered by Sport NZ, currently over half of the Board have completed it. The course has certainly been beneficial, our board remain actively involved and engaged with supporting the delivery of our strategic priorities.

A Reserves Policy was introduced by the board which has a goal of creating a reserve fund equal to 12 months operational costs. This fund received an impressive \$100k this year after prudent fiscal management over the last three years.



Cricket a Game for All

The Development and Pathway reports will go into more detail but the amount of additional opportunities we provided in the 2017-18 season is certainly a positive highlight for me. HK provided increased cricketing opportunities across all facets of our game and included another successful season of Indoor Cricket including our first all Women team, more have a go camps over school holidays, increased female engagement opportunities, New College cricket initiatives for both boys and girls, more volunteer and coaching upskilling evenings, hosting of National fixtures, hosting of more district tournaments and two new girls pathway teams were added to our representative space. I am sure you will all agree this is impressive considering how small our HK team is, certainly a testament to the commitment we have to providing a game for all.

OPPORTUNITIES

Umpires and Scorers Association

I believe energy needs to be spent on improving the current state of our districts HKUSA. There has been a notable decline in active umpires standing in HK. The HKUSA are a separate identity to HKCA so we need to look at useful ways to collaborate and support them to grow this area over the next 12 months.



Network Partnership Agreement 2019-21

An opportunity will arise over the next nine months to put our best case forward for improved support from NZC and CD as we look to develop a three-year Network Partnership Agreement. This piece of work is exciting however will require a fair amount of resourcing. Engaging our members through this process will be important.



In Closing, the future continues to look bright for Horowhenua Kapiti Cricket and I am excited about the opportunities leading our organisation brings. Thanks again to all involved in our wonderful game.

The season of 2017/2018 was a very successful one for the Horowhenua Kapiti Cricket Association with significant progress made in all facets of our development both on and off the field. Our focus on growing cricket in our community and development space is paying dividends with regard to the prowess of our local

players and as a result we had a number gain recognition at district representative level-Kelsey Fahey (CD U19) Fraser Bartholomew (CD U19) Dylan Reder (CD U17) Ayesha Carly Hendry (CD U15 Girls- Captain) Zoe Yeo (CD U15 girls). To have these players recognized with their peers as being amongst the best of their age in the Central Districts is extremely pleasing and displays the capability Horowhenua Kapiti athletes must having qualified coaches that are accessible to our Pathway players is a critical step towards



their progression into and through representative cricket. New Zealand Cricket is driving a new directive to ensure that all coaches are both police vetted and equipped with some form of recognized coaching qualification. This is an initiative that we at HKCA whole heartedly support and lines up with one of our key strategies regarding the upskilling of our regions aspiring coaches. We have been able to increase our coaching numbers and provide both interested parents and prospective coaches with access to training, qualifications and resources. We remain committed to this cause, even more so given the renewed emphasis placed upon it and we can expect not only an increase in the number of coaches within our region but also in the quality of these coaches who will have achieved qualifications and passed police vetting to ensure both a safe environment and a quality one in terms of the athlete's ongoing progression. Damian Parker and Claire Kennett were both recognized at our prizegiving for their contribution to coaching and management and are the finest examples of the caliber of people we have within our region.

Last year we were excited to report the establishment of two new girls pathway cricket teams.

With the increased profile of womens cricket in the world, New Zealand and in our region we can only see our numbers continuing to grow. Following on from the promising launch of HKCA girls cricket, a season highlight for our Juniors was the success of our U15 girls representative team who won both "Team of the year," at the HKCA Prizegiving and "Junior player of the year", with CD U15 Captain Ayesha Carly Hendry picking up the trophy.

It was very fitting that White Fern Hannah Rowe was on hand to present these awards as our special guest and inspiring to see a great



example of the exciting pathway that now exists for both New Zealand and Horowhenua Kapiti's female cricketers.



As with most of the sporting organisations, whilst performances and success on the field are both visible and memorable, it is important to remember the significant governance, direction and leadership required behind the scenes to support the objectives for cricket both in our region and nationally. Our district has been very fortunate to have a Board and Staff that provide the skills, experience, passion and knowledge to ensure the many challenges facing cricket are effectively met. We excitedly anticipate next season and can confidently predict that Horowhenua Kapiti will continue to produce male and female cricketers capable of proudly representing not only their association but also into district level and beyond.

Kelsey Fahey with 43 coming in at number 3 steadying the innings after a difficult start combining with Jamie Pinfold at 5 for a 43run partnership before Kelsey departed. Jamie continued and made his half century before being out caught for 55.

Ramesh Subasinghe and Bailey Te Tomo batted through lunch for a 47-run partnership absorbing a lot of balls to keep Manawatu in the field. Ram ended out LBW for 44 and the lower order spent a gutsy 8 overs keeping Manawatu searching for their final wickets. Shot selection at certain times hampered HK's chance to build a larger total.

Fraser finished with figures of 3 for 67 off 15 overs on a track that didn't give too much assistance to bowlers. Conor Beleski bowled 25 overs for his 2/91 and has his captains' praises for the maturity shown in his approach. Ram also picked up a couple of wickets for 58 off 14.

Manawatu took the first innings points on Sunday and added a lead of 113 for HK to set about batting for the rest of the day to earn some points for a draw.

The task for HK's second innings was to chase down the deficit and bat long into the 78 overs left in the day.

After losing both openers early in the innings, Kelsey Fahey and Dion Sanson built a strong platform for HK and patiently eliminated Manawatu's lead. Dion and Kelsey had a



partnership of 126 and batted for 39 overs which set the tone for the incoming batsmen once Kelsey departed for a hard grafted 53 from 136 balls. After losing Dion shortly after for 79 from 125 balls, With Jamie Pinfold and Rory Lorimer at the crease they steadied the innings and fought through until time for a partnership of 44 off 16 overs, Jamie ending on 32 not out from 43 balls and debutant Rory Lorimer 13* from 53.

Once the first innings points were secured by Hawkes bay they started to lift the run rate and added a decent lead. Two Hawkes bay batsman bringing up centuries and a tough afternoon/early evening for the HK Boys.

Hawkes bay declared over night with a lead of 192. HK had 110 overs to bat to be able to chase down the deficit and bat deep into the overs. Hawkes bay were hungry for the outright and bowled with discipline and patience to claim the result after 43 overs with HK all out for 92.

Not a great result for the first match on home turf with the Donnelly Park block playing very well and the ground was in great condition thanks to the team at Recreational Services.

A tough start to the game with HK at one point 7 down for 80. A 64-run partnership between Kobe Monk 28, and Ryan McCone 49 offered some resistance and helped HK through to 175.

Wanganui 1st Innings

235/10 off 57.2 overs -F Bartholomew 3/54 off 12, R Subasinghe 3/66 off 18.3

First innings points went to Wanganui as they reached 176 with 7 down. Horowhenua came back over night and finished off the tail with Wanganui finishing on 235. A 60-run lead that would need to be knocked off quickly by Horowhenua if they were to push for the win.

Horowhenua Kapiti 2nd Innings

334/7 dec off 47 overs- T Waduge 117, R Taylor 69, R Subasinghe 46, R McCone 44*

Horowhenua were looking to be aggressive in chasing down the lead and posting a total to put pressure on Wanganui. The innings was teetering when HK were 89-4 in the 11th over but Tharaka Waduge was still at the crease playing positive cricket and HK had a lead. He was joined by Ryan Taylor where they enjoyed an attacking partnership of 140 before Tharaka departed with his Maiden HK century on 117 from 108 balls. Tharaka's century and the partnership with Ryan 69 from 70 balls, set Horowhenua up for the lower order to play freely with skipper Ramesh Subasinghe scoring 46 from 27 balls and Ryan McCone 44 from 35. Horowhenua declared at 334/7 in the 47th over with an amazing run rate of 7 an over. The lead was 274.



Wanganui 2nd Innings

128/10 48.1 overs- R McCone 4/6 off 5, C Beleski 2/6 off 6, T Waduge 2/23 off 5.1, D Sanson 2/58 off 20.

Wanganui looked as though they wanted to push for an outright win, but this was put to bed by some great Horowhenua bowling. Ryan McCone ripped through 4 of the Wanganui top 5 batsman to end with outstanding figures of 4 for 6. Dion Sanson held up an end for 20 overs straight keeping the Wanganui batsman at bay with 2/58, a marathon effort. The other wickets were shared by Connor Beleski with great figures from his 6 overs of 2/6 and the 2nd innings century maker Tharaka who finished with 2/23 from 5.1, removing the stubborn Wanganui tail enders defiant stand by taking a wicket with the first ball of a new spell sealing an outstanding victory by the Horowhenua-Kapiti side. This was the first outright victory for HK in 4 seasons.

Donnelly Park 13th – 14th January 2018 Toss won by Wairarapa – elected to bowl

<u>HK 1st Innings</u> 185/10 – 55.4 overs- D Sanson 66, R Taylor 62

Wairarapa won the toss and invited HK to bat first on a green but very dry wicket at Donnelly Park. HK lost Waduge for 4 runs in the 3rd over and Jamie for 17 in the 5th over. This trend continued, and HK lost regular wickets to be struggling at 49 for 4. One of the partnerships of the season saved HK from a collapse with Number 4 Sanson (66) and Number 6 Taylor (62) sharing an attractive 106 runs partnership on a difficult wicket. Both batsmen got hit number of times from rising balls off a length. Sanson departed when the score was on 155/5, then Taylor at 180/6. Good was caught at deep square leg, Rory LBW, Floyd LBW in 3 successive balls to give Daniel Ingham a hat-trick which stopped any chances of HK posting over 200. HK eventually got bowled out for 185.

Wairarapa 1st innings 148/10-R Subasinghe 4/43 off 13, R McCone 3/6 off 8

Daemon Kennett and Ryan McCone started extremely well to have Wairarapa reeling at 26/4, Wairarapa lost wickets in regular intervals and held out until the end of days play with an unbeaten 28 run partnership for the 10th wicket leaving them 148/9. HK then received the news that opening bowler Ryan McCone been called up to the Central Stags squad. Luckily HK was allowed a playing replacement. HK selectors called up off spinner Jimmy Singh of Paraparaumu Cricket Club to make his debut for HK replacing McCone. Captain Subasinghe handed the ball to Jimmy Singh to bowl the first over of the second day and with his very first ball for HK Jimmy dismissed the number XI batsman to achieve first innings points for HK.

Horowhenua Kapiti 2nd Innings 79/10 off 24 overs

Second inning started with Jamie Pinfold getting hit in the 3rd over by a ball that took off from a length. The

opener lost his wicket the very next ball. HK then lost wickets at regular intervals to be bowled out inside 25 overs for a disappointing 79 runs, leaving Wairarapa to chase 115 runs for victory. 1.0 Season Overview

Another season done and dusted for Horowhenua Kapiti Cricket and without doubt this was our biggest to date. Our delivery of cricket started a whole term earlier due to the amount of school interest shown this season. We are now delivering cricket for 3 terms of the year which I am incredibly proud of.

This season our development area has seen huge increases in our school cricket numbers, our junior cubs teams, our female participation as well as intermediate and college cricket.

Both our Horowhenua and Kapiti Schools Superstar Cricket Programmes were huge successes and our respected contracts with both Sport Manawatu and Sport Wellington have ended for the year with great reports being submitted. We have just recently been approved by Sport Maawatu for next season to run another school programme and we hear back from Sport Wellington shortly.

Our females in cricket has increased yet again and expanded on the great work we achieved last season. We now have two GIRLS ONLY side competing in our Cubs Cricket Competition as well as two HKCA Female Representative sides. Our female intermediate and college area has grown bigger than ever before and will only enhance the growing reputation of female cricket in this region.

As well as our development in junior cricket, this year we hosted Central District Hinds games as well as a CD 'A' 3-day game which for our region is huge.





During our preseason planning, it was decided that we would run 'First Smash' which is part of the HKCA Cubs Cricket Junior Structure.

This project was designed to engage those school children we had met in the schools during our Superstar Cricket awareness lessons and who unfortunately were not part of the Superstar school team. This allowed them to carry on their cricket development outside of school. Considering this was our first attempt at running this project, we were blown away by the amount of interest and had to create four extra sessions in



term 4 to just cater for the numbers. We had over 110 school children from the ages of 3-9, taking part in



weekly after school cricket during term 4. Over the Christmas break, many of our 'First Smash' cricketers went onto our T16 grade which saw two extra teams added to Saturday morning cricket on 2018.

Term 1 saw First Smash return with courses in Kapiti and Levin with a total of 30 young cricketers taking part. In

total over 140 young cricketers, have taken part in weekly trainings either through our Term 4 or Term 1 First Smash Programme.





3.0 Superstar Cricket Programme

Our primary schools programme continues to grow quite rapidly. 2017/18 saw us expand the number of schools in Horowhenua from six to eight and Kapiti from five to seven. Our biggest growth was in the Kapiti schools which saw Waikanae, Paraparaumu Beach, Kena Kena and Kapanui all come on board for the first time.

Due to the amount of schools, we had to start running our lessons a term early so started our school programme in term 3 2017. For cricket to be in schools for over most of the year is a huge positive and has increased the opportunity for children to participate in cricket on a regular basis.

Our programme was broken up into 3 main components;

- Awareness Lessons
- Development Lessons
- Interschool Competition/Tournaments





During term 3, The HK development team delivered awareness lessons to NEW schools only and saw over 4000 children from Horowhenua and Kapiti receive a one-hour introductory cricket lesson. Every child who took part in these lessons also received a draw string bag, cricket ball and stumps poster from New Zealand Cricket which I believe is a huge incentive to get kids to initially join in the session.

Once the awareness sessions were completed, term 4 rolled

around and the school put forward students to take

part in the Superstar Cricket Programme. Our team would coach and train these students for a further six hours (one hour per week) teaching them all the skills and knowledge to be able to participate in a modified game of cricket. Lessons are aimed at teaching the students the basics in batting, bowling, fielding and match awareness. Each NEW participant across our region also received a newly designed Horowhenua Kapiti Cricket set to keep. The set had the H-K logo as well as our Cubs Cricket picture on all the equipment.



Term 4 quickly became Term 1 and now it was tournament time. Both seven-week tournaments started very well but with terrible weather around it made it very frustrating for all. Apart from the uncontrollable, the


tournament ran very smoothly with Monday evenings dedicated to the Horowhenua based schools and Tuesday evenings dedicated to the Kapiti schools.

We have two main partners that support our Superstar Programme. We have a Sport Manawatu for our Horowhenua based schools and a Sport Wellington for the Kapiti based schools. Our two-year contract with Sport Wellington has just finished and as part of that contract, we had to deliver cricket to over 4,414 students in the Kapiti area. This season we



delivered cricket awareness lessons to over 3,360 school children in Kapiti alone, bringing our total to 4,896 students reached in the last 24 months. This is a huge commitment undertaken by HK one we are extremely proud of delivering for the future of our game.





4.0 Intermediate Cricket

Part of our cricketing pathway in H-K is to ensure that cricket can be played in primary, intermediate and college environments to ensure there is minimal drop off. As our members progress through intermediate and college it is important for HK to drive opportunities in these areas to continue to capitalize on the ground work being achieved at the primary school level. Our intermediate programme was one of the highlights of the year. Fairfield, Koputaroa, Taitoko and Levin Intermediate all entered a Girls Only side into the programme which saw all participants receive four cricket specific lessons as well as a Festival Tournament in Term 1 2018. Our girls played a modified version of cricket and for the first time ever, we introduced hard ball games with full protective equipment.





These games were a huge success and we have defiantly spotted

some potential for these girls to either play club cricket for Girls Only teams or even join our HKCA Under 13's or 15's sides. To ensure consistency throughout our development, these modified games were aligned with our Girls Only College Formats which would allow those moving to college, to transition into hardball cricket

comfortably. Smaller pitches, smaller boundaries and a modified hard ball gave these girls the perfect introductory experience into hard ball cricket. Fairfield were our eventual winners, beating Koputaroa in the final but it was more than who just won and lost, it was about participation, fostering friendships and having a heap of fun while also raising the profile of female cricket in this region.

5.0 College Cricket

After the 2016/17 season, we decided to try and put more of a focus on college cricket in this region. In line with NZC guidelines, we created two new college tournaments; T20 Super Smash (boys) and College Super 8's (girls). Both tournaments ran in Term 4 and Term 1 with the aim to get our college players playing more games and training less. Waiopehu, Kapiti, Paraparaumu and Horowhenua Colleges all entered 1 team each into our boys and girl's tournaments with Kapiti College entering two girls only teams. The boys played traditional 11 a side T20 fixtures while the girls' games were modified to 16 overs and 8 players per side. They also used a modified hard ball which I received great feedback from.

T20 Boys

The T20 Boys Competition was a great success and I received great feedback from both players and the schools. Some of our college players only play a handful of games per year so to be able to provide a local T20 midweek competition that develops players match awareness and skill is something that is only going to benefit this region. Kapiti College played Horowhenua College in the final after a 3-week round robin in term 4 and saw



Horowhenua prevail. With Horowhenua winning, they advanced in the CD Ross Taylor T20 Competition. They won their first knock out game before losing to Palmy Boys High just before the semifinals.

Girls Super 8's



This was the first time HKCA have run a local Girls College Competition in a long time. We were overwhelmed to see the amount of interest from the college girls, over 50 girls across four local colleges took part in the modified games. Our Term 4 tournament was a huge success with all the participants having loads of fun and bonding with other college girls over cricket. From this tournament, HKCA created its first ever HKCA Under 15's Girls Pathway side. We ran the same competition in term 1 but had problems as Paraparaumu and Horowhenua College couldn't get a girls' team out due to other sporting commitments

but for our first year running this we were extremely pleased with the results.

Next season I will be looking at running the same tournaments with a member of our staff running weekly training sessions at the colleges for both boys are girls to engage them in cricket.

مر <u>6.0 HKCA Cubs Junior Cricket</u>

The birth of 'HKCA Cubs Junior Cricket' has been a revelation this season. The strategic decision of bringing everyone back under our region playing junior cricket was a great move done at exactly the right time. Over the last three years, HKCA have delivered very successful development programmes for both boys and girls. These programmes are continuing to succeed and grow in numbers. HKCA

identified that we needed to


transition those playing school/intermediate/college cricket into clubs within our region which creates a sustainable pathway for all our cricketers.

Cubs Cricket offers three suitable formats and is based around individuals' stage not age so new older

children can take part in a format that suits them and younger children who are excelling can be easily challenged. NZC guidelines have been followed which allows for clear alignment with our national body.

HKCA have recently implemented a junior cricket pathway which

allows all those playing cricket to join teams outside of school. 'HKCA Cubs Cricket' has seen Horowhenua Kapiti produce record numbers of Saturday morning teams. Just two years ago, HKCA had 14 teams playing junior cricket either in Manawatu or Wellington competitions. The 2017/18 season saw HKCA boast an impressive 32 junior teams all playing under our H-K banner. We believe our development programmes, along with a solid junior cricketing structure, has created a clear, sustainable cricketing pathway for ALL our cricket participants.





7.0 Female Cricket

Horowhenua Kapiti female development space has grown yet again. Off the back of the successful Superstar Programme and 'Females in Cricket' Initiative, we have managed to create two Girls Only Saturday Morning Teams. Before we started this female programme, we only had 3 female players under 18 playing in HK.



Girls School Cricket

The 2017/18 season over 3,500 students participate in school awareness lessons. Roughly 50% of those participants would have been female which is providing equal opportunities for both boys and girls to participate in cricket. We believe by exposing our school girls to a fun, modified version of the game we will help attract them to the sport. 32% of all the primary school players this season were females. We hope to increase this number to 40% by 2018/19 and continue to promote female cricket in our schools.

Girls Cubs Cricket

Mikaela Grieg has continued to train our squad of girls that we recruited last season on Friday evenings at the Basil Netten Indoor Centre. The development of these girls over the past two seasons has been massive with both teams competing in our 'Cubs Cricket' Competition and doing exceedingly well. We are extremely confident that the amount of energy and resources we are putting into the female game we will start to see more of these Girls Only teams participating in our local competitions in the coming years.

Girls Intermediate and College Cricket

Part of our cricketing pathway in H-K is to ensure that females can play cricket all throughout their school life. As touched on before, our intermediate girls were introduced to hard ball games with full protective equipment. To ensure consistency throughout our development area, these modified games were aligned with our Girls Only College games which would allow those moving to college, to transition into hardball cricket comfortably.





8.0 Central Hinds Day Out

What a day! Will go down as probably one of the highlights of the year from a development day point of view. On 24th November 2017, HK hosted Central District Hinds Vs Wellington Blaze in a three-day event held down



at Donnelly Park. Through communication with Central Districts, we managed to have available the entire Hinds squad for two hours to go into schools and run some lessons. Koputaroa, Fairfield, Levin North and Taitoko were the lucky schools that took part in the day. Each school had two lessons with over 40 girls at each school participating.

Each school had one member of our HK team 'running' the session with 3 Hinds women actively getting involved. The

sessions went as well as we had hoped for and the Hinds were fantastic in the way they interacted with the teachers and schools. HK are fans of promoting the game of cricket through our local stars and the Hinds were magic all day.

Each school received a signed Hinds cricket bat and each session



finished off with a question and answer discussion with the girls. Once the school visits were completed, the Hinds came down to warm up for their game. Our T16 Cubs Cricket sides were all playing at the park prior to the Hinds taking the field so once their games finished, they came and watched the final hour of the Blaze/Hinds game. 2017/18 was a landmark season for community cricket in Horowhenua-Kapiti.

It saw the return of our own independent junior cricket competitions for the 1st time in decades, with record numbers of our local youth involved. Our club competitions continued to be very competitive and our senior clubs again excelled in the Coastal Challenge Cup with three HKCA teams making the semifinals.

Club Cricket

On the field Paraparaumu C.C were again the standout club. They defeated Wanganui United this time away from home to retain the coastal challenge trophy, they also took out our own 50 over competition defeating Kapiti Old Boys in the Final. Their lower grade teams took out the Senior B One day competition and the Presidents Grade T20.

Levin Old boys took home the Hall Shield, defeating Kapiti Old Boys in the final and their Senior B side won their T20 competition. Kapiti Old Boys took out the Premier 2 Trophy and Otaki Sports were again champions in the Presidents grade.

Whilst our top club teams have been performing well, some clubs are finding it harder to fill lower grade teams, it will be a focus this year to further strengthen our club links with the secondary schools in our district to make the transition from school to club cricket less daunting and encourage more college cricketers to make that move. We are also going to provide more opportunities for short format cricket, through both the Sunday Premier 2 and presidents grade T20 competitions, to encourage more mature cricketers to take up or return to our game, with a reduced time commitment.

Another exciting change for the season ahead is the further expansion of the Coastal Challenge Cup to include teams from Wairarapa. Hopefully our clubs will rise to this added challenge and bring back the trophy to HK once again.

ہر۔ HKCA Cubs Junior Cricket

At the end of last season, the HK junior cricket community placed a large responsibility in our hands; agreeing to support an HKCA run standalone Junior cricket competition. A huge amount of work was done in the off season by both HKCA staff and the Junior Committees from Weraroa CC, LOBCC and Kapiti Juniors. Fine tuning the various formats and rules to be played was achieved. It was agreed that our junior cricket would be called Cubs cricket which provided an early alignment with HKCA Senior Men Bears side. It was decided we should



have 4 separate competitions that kids could play according to their age and stage of ability.

First Smash – A 6-week introductory skills-based programme run after school, mid-week in both term 4 and term 1

T16 Blast – A 16 over dual pitch / soft ball format, designed to be an introduction to cricket in a game situation. Played on Friday evenings

T20 Smash – Our introductory modified hard ball grade played on Saturday mornings. Our kids 1st opportunity to play "real" cricket complete with Pads, gloves and Helmets!

T24 Super Smash – For our most accomplished junior cricketers, a level up from T20 Smash, this grade allows players to test their skills in a more traditional cricket format, which will prepare them well for cricket at secondary school and beyond.

Along with online registrations, registration days were held in both Levin and Paraparaumu. Turnout was overwhelming with nearly 400 children registering; more than 2 1/2 times the number of registered players from our district last season. This vote of support from the community allowed us to field 29 teams across our 3 competitive formats and provide introductory cricket to over 120 kids through the 1st Smash programme. We received fantastic support from our cricket family that enabled us to make the most of this great response. Our Senior Clubs in Levin have stepped up and taken on more junior teams, assisting them with coaches / facilities and knowledge; while in Kapiti our two senior clubs have taken on Junior sides for the 1st time in many years, supporting the great work that the Kapiti Juniors have continued with in the South.


Our initial season has proved successful, we have had great feedback from our Cubs cricketers their coaches and parents. Being able to create and run our very own competitions has allowed us to better meet our members needs in delivering cricket, it allowed us to customise the times, formats and venues to best suit their needs rather than relying on them being met in other associations competitions. They have been overwhelmingly positive in their responses but have also helped us identify a few areas where we can improve our delivery of cricket to make our 2nd Season of Cubs cricket even bigger and better!!

The audited financial accounts show that HKCA has recorded a profit of \$91k for the year ending 31st May 2018.

This is now our third consecutive positive financial result for HK. Income increased by 21% vs last year, this was mainly due to an increase in grant funding received, the growth in sales and service income and the result

of hosting more events.

Expenditure as forecasted last year has risen as we continued to invest in our people and increased resources in this area. Advertising expenses increased by 800% this year due to our investment in the successful launch of HKCA Cubs Junior Cricket. Depreciation doubled as expected with the increase in our assets in 2017. Tournament hosting costs also increased by however this was offset by the increase in revenue received for hosting more events. Tournament, Travel and Accommodation expenses were a lot higher +14k due to the increase in the number of Pathway sides we now have vs 2017.

Asset purchases of 15k this year included a new covered trailer, two quality gazebos, portable irrigation system and an air roller. Our closing value of assets increased to \$55k up from \$52k last year with depreciation of 13k for the year.

At the time of writing this report the Board had recently signed off its Reserves Policy which states a Reserve Fund equal to 12 months of Operational Expenditure be achieved by 2025. The current target is \$365k I am pleased to say the first 100k has been achieved and has been secured under this policy, this is something we should all be

Forecasting into FY 2019 - I would be surprised if current income levels can be maintained and we are budgeting on this being less than levels achieved in 2018. Support of the LCF with investment into the completion of the Basil Netten Indoor Center will be required by HK this financial year. As always, we will monitor regularly our financial position and plan accordingly to make sure HK produces another positive result. I would like to take this opportunity to thank Fluker Denton & Co. who conduct the Audit Review of our HKCA annual accounts.
