The past year saw consolidation of the Association in its many facets of running a cricket organisation, despite the season finishing early and abruptly due to the Covid-19 pandemic.

Community cricket continued to grow at the junior level in particular; sustained by the very high penetration into the primary schools in our district.

Representative cricket fortunes varied during the season, but the Association continued to field teams in all competitions, providing the pathway for excellence of our cricket fraternity.

The annual report provides significant details of the matches and performances during the season.

New Zealand Cricket and Central Districts Cricket continued their support during the year and have indicated a similar level of financial support for the coming season which is excellent news for us.

Our indoor centre and pavilion continued to improve as further progress was made to upgrade the centre to first class playing conditions and we acknowledge the continuing support of Horowhenua District Council who continue to invest in the ground facilities at Donnelly Park.

With continued support from gaming trusts, sponsors and cricket hosting, the financial result is similar to that of the previous year with a surplus of \$50,100. The Board has added this to the reserves of the Association. This is a prudent position in ensuring the necessary resources are available for cricket in the coming year which can be supported by the reserves if required, given the uncertainties that surround cricket and our lives in general in the coming year.

This year we welcomed Deborah Selby and Bevan Sanson as aspiring Directors to the Board. Their interest in cricket and the personal skills they have will contribute to the balanced set of skills required for the Board in the future. John Fluker and Shaun Tyson will retire from the Board this year and are not available for reelection.

A special thanks to our CEO, David O'Brien, and his team for the outstanding work and commitment they bring to our administration. Their enthusiasm in working with the volunteer base and parents of young cricketers is exceptional and is reflected in the very strong position the Association finds itself in many aspects of cricket.

I wish you every success at all levels of cricket in the coming season.

Cricket has now been played in our region for 145 years and I am extremely privileged to be playing a small part by presenting my 5th Chief Executive report for the Horowhenua Kapiti Cricket Association. Another year completed and wow what an interesting end we all endured. An abrupt end to the season forced by a globally pandemic was a first for many. Not something anyone can ever really plan for however I can safely say as a cricket community we evolved and navigated this challenging period well.

The forced house arrest for us all provided opportunity to take stock of what matters in our lives and allowed time for reflection of how we personally view things. For me I was able to both look back on all the exciting things we have achieved at HK this past year and start to critically think about how the next period for our Association looks.

We continue as a region to excel well beyond what our resourcing should allow, we achieve this by having great leadership from our Board of Directors and CD Cricket, Guidance and insights from NZ Cricket and most significantly the many engaged and committed people either working or volunteering within our cricket family. Others I know are envious of many of the good things we have in place throughout our region.

Covid-19 has caused disruption and there is no doubt it will impact some areas of the new season. At the International Level fixtures are hard to plan, Domestic Cricket Scheduling is near impossible which in turns impacts Hawke Cup, Regional Tournaments, our inter-district and local club competitions. We prudently reduced budgeted spend through winter due to uncertainties and are now better positioned to provide resourcing to our region for the upcoming season. Good communication with our stakeholders through this period was carried out seeing all Clubs who applied receive financial support.

Looking back, we achieved for the second year in a row all the KPI's set by NZ Cricket and Central Districts held within our Network Partnership Agreement. A highlight, as mentioned in recent media, was our achievement of a 100% ratio of Qualified and Vetted Coaches to the number of teams we have, only one other District in the country achieved this fantastic result.

An exciting piece of work that will take place at the back end of 2020 will be the development of a new Strategic Plan. We have an exceptional and engaged Board of Directors who will identify key strategic areas that will shape our direction for the next few years. Aligning and working closely with our members, Central Discricts and NZ Cricket will play an important part in the creation of this exciting project.

Our HK team continue to champion their areas of influence and their efforts must be applauded. Chad Law has been a ROCK this season and continues to deliver quality work with a real passion for our people and region. Bailey and his support team of Fraser and Monique got through a mountain of work providing multiple participation opportunities through a vast range of community programmes. Matt Gibbs kept the local Club Competitions running smoothly and played a pivotal part in our growing Event Management space. Gary O'Brien in the newly created position of Volunteer and Umpires Co Ordinator was fantastic in his first year in

the role. With new umpires standing and the creation of a up to date Volunteers database a real benefit to us

I would also like to acknowledge the many hours our growing volunteer base puts into making HKCA a better place. Our Volunteers are the lifeblood of our Community game and without their support the quality product we deliver would suffer. We have an amazing group of people willing to step up and help us achieve more.

We continue to challenge our operational professionalism and I am pleased to say the new level we embarked on last year has continued and a sound business approach is taken to decision making. Our Board led by John Fluker have again been highly supportive to the operational team and the inclusion of both Deb Selby and Bevan Sanson as aspiring directors has provided a positive new fresh outlook.

I would personally like to thank John for his ongoing support towards me, John has decided to retire this year after many years given to Cricket. He leaves at the top of his game and I am eternally grateful for what he has helped HK achieve over the last five years as our Chair.

I am extremely satisfied with the progress we continue to make both on and off the park. In this report, I have shared a few of my highlights for season 2019-20 along with some areas of opportunity for advancement in 2019-20.

Our Biggest space and one of the most exciting. A real focus was put into engaging Junior and Youth Girls this season with targeted



progammes being delivered in both Kapiti and Horowhenua. I am pleased to say we continue to see growth in this area. Studies show it is not all about "Cricket" for this group but connecting with a fun and engaging product so the introduction of music, water balloon and other games were a bit of a hit. We plan to continue this into next season. An engagement session and dinner with the Central Hinds was also a real highlight for the HK Girls. Our FESTIVAL OF CRICKET was a fantastic event which had Donnelly Park host two rounds of the Womens National Competition.



Club Cricket saw consistent numbers of Teams throughout all grades and I am pleased to say there was a large spike in growth of Youth Teams at the Colleges, due to the work embarked on 3 years ago with the introduction of HK Cubs Cricket. The return of the Coastal Challenge Cup to our Region after Whanganui took it for the first time the year before was welcomed with Levin Old Boys winning it for the first time.

Build the base, provide quality infrastructure, and get quality people driving the bus is a recipe for success. I am confident we are now leading the way in this area. Completion of quality changing room facilities, two first class graded outdoor cages, and a new grass block have all been infrastructure projects undertaken and delivered this season as we continue to improve our HQ at Donnelly Park. All will be in use this upcoming season.

Our Pathway teams all continue to improve both in skill level and as people. The Better People, Better Cricketers Philosophy is constantly on display. These improvements start at the top and Chad has really made a huge positive impact in many of our players. High Performance and Pathway Report 2019-2020

The season of 2019/20 was immensely successful for the Horowhenua Kapiti Cricket Association. I think about the theme of our HK Senior Men during this year's pre-season planning session. A year prior we were working out how to get started whereas we were now working out how to continue, how to go up another level and how to build on the considerable base we had established and success we had experienced. I feel as though this has been a theme that is applicable throughout the Pathway space this season in that it has been imperative for us to go up a level from what was a hugely successful se ason prior. We did not want to fall victim to second year syndrome or take any backward steps and this is what drove a hugely successful future Bears Winter Coaching Programme as well as our Pathway Pre-Season Programme.



Our focus on growing cricket in our community and development space is paying dividends regarding the prowess of our local players. As a result, we had some outstanding performances from our pathway teams in their respective fixtures and tournaments against their counterparts both throughout the CD region and beyond. I believe that it is incredibly powerful for our Junior Pathway Players to have a local side for them to look up to and aspire to representing. Our HKCA HMC Senior Men's Team are showing that they are capable of being that team, leading from the front with a very strong season to record 3rd place finishes in both Chapple Cup and Furlong Cup. This side is growing it's supporter base



being a respected opposition throughout our age grades as well as being admired for the way in which we go about our business. We believe that the growth at the top will filter back down to our Year 6's and up again as we seek to inspire our players both male and female to want to represent their region at the highest level and beyond.

New Zealand Cricket continues to drive its directive to ensure that all coaches are both police vetted and equipped with some form of recognized coaching qualification. This is an initiative that we at HKCA continue to support whole heartedly and it lines up with one of our key strategies regarding the upskilling of our regions aspiring coaches. We have been able to increase our coaching numbers and provide both interested parents and prospective coaches with access to training, qualifications, and resources. We remain committed to this cause, even more so given the renewed emphasis placed upon it and we can expect not only an increase in the number of coaches within our region but also in the quality of these coaches. They will have achieved qualifications and passed police vetting to ensure both a safe environment and a quality one in terms of the athlete's ongoing progression. As can be seen Coach Development continues to be a significant area moving forward and rightly so given the significance of these people in the growth of our participants. Paul Mahar, Daniel Block and all of our coaches and volunteers were recognized at our prizegiving for their contribution to coaching, management and facilitation and are the finest examples of the caliber of people we have within our region.

A considerable amount of work was put in last Winter in the form of a User Pays Winter Programme and Pathway Squad Pre Season Programmes. This allowed for skill specific technical work whilst also allowing for a broad approach in terms of addressing the many things that can contribute to a young persons growth and development personally and as cricketers. Amongst these things were a focus on Strength and Conditioning, Goal Setting, Mental Strength, Tactics, Team Building and Culture. Something which exemplified our ongoing growth was the squad sizes that we carried through our Pathway Pre-Season Programme where in some cases we had up to 19 players attending training. Our philosophy here is ensuring that we are not operating exclusively and that we are providing equal opportunity to those players that may not be in the "top 10" but have potential and would benefit from ongoing coaching. This ensures that we are able to build crucial depth

and has seen us field development teams for various fixtures. This is something we are proud of and plan on continuing and trust that it will pay dividends in the coming seasons. Our ultimate goal here is to have a Senior Women's team which would complete the local Association Pathway for our aspiring female cricketers whilst helping them on their way to selection for the Central Hinds and ultimately the White Ferns. The Mens Emerging Players is a space we continue to work to establish, providing a crucial link in the pathway from U17's to Senior Representative Cricket.



Our philosophy is a hollistic view where we aim to develop a good person first and foremost in the knowledge

that this will help them in life whilst also developing a good cricketer. We understand how important it is to know our role in our players lives and that role is often as a mentor, support person and supporter- we just so happen to be coaching them cricket as well. This philosophy has seen our coaches work to understand each player as best as possible so as to be able to facilitate their development on and off the field in a way that is best suited to them.



The 2019-2020 season finished in unprecedented fashion with the emergence

of Covid 19 scuttling the final month of cricket as well as our traditional means of tying up the season with prizegivings. Our cricketing community came together utilising the connections and networks to support each other as well as local businesses heading into, during and following lockdown. We ran our Prizegiving via our Facebook platform and were extremely grateful to receive assistance from Central Stags and Hinds members as well as Stags Coach Aldin Smith and CD CEO Pete de Wet. We were desperate to do justice to our award winners and we believe this was the next best thing to being able to get them up on stage. Through vidoe presentations based around the videos from our respective presenters we were able to celebrate our region, our Association and our people in a way that everybody was proud of.

As with most sporting organizations, whilst performances and success on the field are both visible and memorable, it is important to remember the significant governance, direction and leadership required behind the scenes to support the objectives for cricket both in our region and nationally. Our district continues to be

very fortunate to have a Board and Staff that provide the skills, experience, passion and knowledge to ensure the many challenges facing cricket are effectively met. We excitedly anticipate next season and can confidently predict that Horowhenua Kapiti will continue to produce male and female cricketers capable of proudly representing not only their association but also moving into district level and beyond. Most importantly we foresee them doing this in a manner that themselves, their family and Horowhenua Kapiti Cricket can be proud of whilst developing skills that will not only be of benefit to their cricket but also stand them in good stead for their journey in life.

Pre-Season tour to Vanuatu

The Horowhenua Kapiti Senior Men's cricket team visited the Island of Efate in Vanuatu as part of their 2019-20 preseason programme. An opportunity that would provide all with lifelong memories, challenges and experiences hard to find in our neck of the woods.

Prior to our first game we awoke to the morning rain and thoughts of no game being possible. However, in true pacific island fashion the rain cleared, the ground drained quickly and an 11am start was decided. Two new Bears were capped as Dylan Reder #302 and Ajay Kumar #303 received their Baggies from Nigel Brooke.

Captain, Andre Halbert won the toss and elected to field first with the HK bowlers preparing to run in. The weather constantly came and went making it hard to get any traction into a quality Vanuatu batting side. The locals scored 277/4 off 35 with HK reduced to 95 all out. The lads were disappointed in the result, however, knew that the fixture was only a steppingstone in the seasons journey.





That evening we were invited to attend a formal function hosted by The Holiday Inn to name the Vanuatu side heading away on the 8th September to the World Cup Challenge League in Malaysia. Our team got to interact and enjoy the company of the Vanuatu players who were exceptionally humble and good natured.

During our Sunday visit to Hideaway Island the team played beach cricket with the local Mele Village kids who were swimming on the mainland. It was an awesome highlight and

one experience the Bear's side will never forget. We left all the cricket gear with the kids so they could keep playing our favourite summer sport.

On Monday the team had the privilege of visiting Vila East School to interact and engage with the children through cricket. Some of the Vanuatu Team also joined us for what was a most enjoyable couple of hours.

Bailey Te Tomo and Matt Good lead a fun game of cricket with the whole squad joining in teaching the children the basics of our game.

We also visited some classrooms and lead some Mathematics and Spelling lessons. We left HKCA Cubs Cricket Packs with all these classes so they could continue playing our game after we had gone.



The smiles and laughter of the children will remain a highlight with all who took part for a long time to come.

On Tuesday the Bear's played their second fixture vs Vanuatu. Skipper Andre Halbert won the toss and elected to bat. The teams were playing today on a Hybrid pitch which has a mixture of soil, artificial grass with an artificial base. It gets rolled and covered like a normal pitch but is more suitable to the weather on the island. This was an exciting proposition for our team and another opportunity for a new experience. The team batted

well putting up a respectable total of 158/8 off 40 overs, with Matt Good (37) and Chad Law (24) the pick of the batsman. Rain continued to play its part in reducing overs and Vanuatu batted for 25 overs before time was up with light fading and they were finding it a tougher test than the previous game, finishing on 142/4 after 25 overs. HK bowlers all improved with Carter Andrew being the pick with figures of 8 overs 2 for 24 including two maidens.





During the game David O'Brien and Nigel Brooke presented Vanuatu Cricket with a huge parcel of donated cricket gear from HK, Central Districts Cricket and NZ Cricket. The gear was to help develop the game locally and help get more children involved like the ones we visited at the beach and Vila East School. Vanuatu Development Manager, Pierre Chilia was extremely thankful of the gesture and indicated the donation would reach a lot of children throughout the wider islands of Vanuatu.

Pierre had also organised for our team to join him and the people of Mele Village for a meal cooked in a traditional Umu after the game. This was another highlight for the HK lads as they got to visit and immerse themselves into village life. Pigs and dogs roaming freely, humble abo

des, well-kept and productive gardens and a couple of "bars" selling "Shells" of Kava.

Mike Masauvakalo and the village sang us farewell and embraced us all as members of the Mele Village, this ending to what was an exceptional 5 days was extremely moving for our touring squad.

HK Bears start 2019/20 Furlong Cup off with a Roar!

The Horowhenua Kapiti Senior Men's Rep side made a huge statement in the Furlong Cup with their first-round outright victory against Wairarapa on the weekend at Donnelly Park.

On a deck that looked to offer a bit for the bowlers early, HK leader Andre Halbert chose to back himself and the rest of the top order when he won the toss and batted first. The decision looked dubious at 62-3 with Bailey Te Tomo, Matthew Good and Kelsey Fahey back in the sheds cheaply. This



left Halbert and player-coach Chad Law at the crease and the pair started to go about their work and played with impressive patience and temperament as they denied Wairarapa and the opportunity to gain further inroads and started to tick the score up as the openers baked in the hot Levin weather. Halbert was eventually dismissed for 69 from 163 deliveries and was soon followed by Jamie Pinfold. Keegan Maclachlan looked good while at the crease until he fell to the bowling of Stephan Hook who bowled a mammoth effort of 27 overs 11 maidens 1-43, figures that do not in the slightest reflect how well the seamer bowled. This meant debutant Dylan Reder entered Hawke Cup Cricket for the first time at 159-6 with the game in the balance. Reder rose to the occasion and began fearlessly attacking the Wairarapa bowlers, playing his natural game Reder upped the run rate at a critical time in the game as Chad Law took a back seat and watched Reder lead the way as the pair got us through to 237-7. Law, who was once again battling injury, fell for 63 from 198 deliveries, an innings of which the importance can't be overstated in the context of the match. Andrews and Bartholomew fell cheaply trying to up the scoring rate and Liam Pinfold saw Reder through to a deserved 50 before he hit one to deep mid-wicket to end the innings at 257. The Childs twins from the Wairarapa Bush both bowled well without luck Ethan taking 3-56 and Quinn 4-47 proving that they will be huge players for both Wairarapa in the Hawke Cup and Red Star in our Coastal Challenge Cup this season.



HK went into the field with 14 overs left in the day and with what is becoming a habit for the team, they proved that you don't want to face a Bear late in the day, reducing Wairarapa to 27-5. Carter Andrews with relentless accuracy and Fraser Bartholomew charging in with some serious fizz doing the damage as Andrews clean bowled opener Mckenzie with a peach to start proceedings and Bartholomew snagged four Wairarapa victims including the key wickets of Brock Price first ball and Jaco Vorster with the last ball of the day sparking wild celebrations.

Day 2 began, and HK showed no signs of slowing down as Wairarapa was dismissed for 61. Ethan Childs, Anthony Sprownson and remarkable 15-year-old debutant Jake Jonas were the only players to enter double figures. Carter Andrews finished with 2-18 from his 8 overs, Daemon Kennett cleaned up the tail with 2-2 from 3 overs and Fraser Bartholomew claimed 6-22 from his 13 overs. Halbert enforced the follow

on and Wairarapa went out to bat again but all that pre-season fitness paid off for the Bears. Carter Andrews and Daemon Kennett reduced Wairarapa to 16-3 before Jaco Vorster and Jack Forrester formed a partnership

to get their side up to 43 before Liam Pinfold joined the party, taking 3-12 from 6 overs Liam operated how he

does swinging the ball both ways with good control and ramped up the pace when he needed too.

Carter

Andrews came back and cleaned up the tail to grab himself a very impressive 4-26, Kennett grabbed 2 and Bartholomew 1 to bring the Wairarapa innings to a close with the score at 83, giving the Bears an outright victory with maximum bowling points. A massive performance from Jamie Pinfold behind the stumps with 10 dismissals for the match, to go from a very part-time wicketkeeper to put in a performance like that within 2 seasons is an amazing achievement due to a lot of work behind the scenes.



HK Bears finish third equal in Chapple Cup!

The first round in the Chapple Cup competition for 2019 saw Horowhenua Kapiti come up against Nelson. H/K started in the best possible fashion when Captain Andre Halbert won the toss and chose to bat. An opening stand of 39 in quick time ensured H/K got off to the bright start they wanted. Chad Law was in aggressive form and his 21 off 28 balls and Jamie Pinfolds 28 off 33 set the scene for what was to be a good all-round team performance. Bailey Te Tomo 62 from 70, Andre Halbert 66 from 64 and a very impressive Kelsey Fahey with 66 not out from 34 ensured H/K set a very imposing 308 for 7 from their 50 overs.



In reply Nelson, went about accumulating runs at a good pace. Centuries from Finn Raxworthy (128) from 121 Balls) and C.D. 4-day captain Greg Hay (106 from 108 Balls) ensured they were on target to reach their goal. The loss of Raxworthy's wicket caught by Andre Halbert off Liam Pinfold (3-59 off 10) followed closely by Hay's wicket caught by Carter Andrews of Fraser Bartholomew's (2 for 44 off 10) bowling, put a big hold on Nelsons progress. From then on H/K took the chances offered and together with some very good line and length bowling they showed some real fight and determination to come out

winners by 12 runs and gave them the opportunity to advance to the Chapple Cup Semi Finals with the powerhouse of Hawkes Bay awaiting them.

After winning the toss, Hawkes Bay decided to bat on a very flat, hard wicket. The option to bat first backfired a little as Carter Andrew secured the prized wicket of Hawkes Bay opener Bradley Wiggins, in the first over

LBW for 0. A couple of quick wickets to Liam Pinfold had Hawkes Bay reeling at 4 for 106 and an upset looked a very strong possibility. A middle order revival from Todd Watson (47) and William Clarke 48 at 7 and 8 and 16 extras from the H/K Bowlers ensured Hawkes Bay were able to put together a respectful and ultimately defendable total of 255. That total could have been much bigger were it not for some very good at the death bowling from the H/K bowlers. They put in a good effort not only restricting Hawkes Bay to their lowest total runs for the weekend, but in the process were able to bowl out their highly regarded line up. Pick of the bowlers for H/K were Liam Pinfold and Dylan Reder who both picked up 3 wickets while Daemon Kennett picked up two while Carter Andrews and Fraser Bartholomew picked up one each.



The H/K side were optimistic of reaching the target set by Hawkes Bay but got off to the worst possible start losing opener Jamie Pinfold for 1 in the first over. They never really recovered, losing wickets at regular intervals. Apart from a very good knock of 69 from 50 balls from Kelsey Fahey and 21 from Chad law the H/K batters struggled to come to terms with some tight effective bowling. They were bowled out in the 45 over for 135.

Game 3 saw Wairarapa win the toss and choose to put Horowhenua Kapiti into bat. A good third wicket 72 run partnership from Jamie Pinfold, who ended up with 68 and Matt Goode 44, put things back on track for H/K after a shaky start. Once again Kelsey Fahey with a very good 31 off 21 balls added some well-earned grunt and allowed H/K to finish with a respectable total of 176 off their allocated 20 overs.

In reply Wairarapa got off to a real flyer and a very big score looked on the cards. A spell of good line and length bowling from Fraser Bartholomew (3-10 off 4), put the brakes on Wairarapa's momentum. Another

impressive effort was from part time bowler Matt Good (1-21 off 4) who added some real stability in the mid overs when it was needed.

In a close finish H/K came out on top with a well-deserved 10 run victory.



Game 4 vs Taranaki had H/K going into this game resembling a casualty ward at a regional hospital. At one stage it looked as though they would not be able to field 11 fit players. Injuries to Captain Andre Halbert (Shoulder), Chad Law (Knee), Matt Good (Fingers), Blake de Burgh (Knee) put huge pressure on this team to put up a good performance. Such is the determination of this team many played through the pain barrier to ensure H/K were not only competitive but showed some real heart to perform in the manner in which they did.

Taranaki won the toss and chose to bat. A very aggressive approach from the Taranaki batters meant H/K were often behind the 8 ball. At the end of the allocated 20 overs Taranaki had scored 205. While the H/K bowlers were under huge pressure, they never gave up in what were difficult circumstances. Dylan Reder had the impressive figures of 4 overs, 2 wickets for 33 and Kelsey Fahey continuing from the previous days good performance with the bat finished with game best figures of 4 overs 2 wickets for 28 Runs.

In reply H/K were never allowed to settle into the game. The loss of regular wickets meant H/K were never in the hunt, and they were dismissed without getting past the 120 mark in reply.

A batting display of quality by Manawatu opening batter Mason Hughes in the second innings, of 139 not out from 67 balls dashed any hopes of Horowhenua Kapiti Bears cricket team, from gaining maximum points from their Furlong Cup match last weekend.

Another season flies by for Horowhenua Kapiti Cricket and yet our development space continues to grow for the fifth year in row now. We continue to start delivery in Term 3 with a huge number of school interest and delivering multiple school programs. We continue to deliver cricket 3 terms of the year for a third time

running.

Both Horowhenua and Kapiti primary and intermediate school programs were a huge success this year with great reports being submitted throughout the year and our relationships with both Sport



Wellington and Sport Manawatu continue to grow. This season saw many programs debut this year with primary school indoor cricket running alongside the adults. Also our Sport Wellington Female Super8's programme take place which saw 6 intermediates and 2 colleges involved in Kapiti which saw over 500 girls involved. This season also seen the first ever Yeah!GIRLS initiative take place. This program is designed to keep girls active through the age group of 10-16 and introduce cricket to girls in a never seen before way.

Female cricket continues to be a prominent focus with more cricketing opportunities for females continuing to become available with numerous girls only festival days throughout our school programs. We are starting to see more girls playing club cricket as well continuing to produce two HKCA female pathway sides.

This season a huge amount of work was put into our coach development space. A lot a time went into this space hosting two evenings volunteers, coaches both in Horowhenua and Kapiti. We had great turn outs to these evenings with a huge amount of people completing their coach practical courses. We are proud to say we meet our targets and all coaches are fully qualified through NZC Friendly Manger and were one of only two districts throughout the country that had a 100% Registered, Police Vetted and Qualified Coaching Team.





This is our third year running first smash and it was another successful year. While school cricket continues to grow, we want to keep giving cricketing opportunities to you youngsters and I could not think of a better program to do it through. The decision to change for the format of first smash was excellent. In total, 10 weeks of cricket was taught to over 50, 3-7-year olds across both Kapiti and Horowhenua. Term four saw six lessons which involved learning the game, and the basics of cricket. Term 1 had

the participants put their skills and learning into game situations as they played modified T16 styled cricket

games for the remaining 4 sessions. First Smash is designed to engage those school children we meet in our schools during our school cricket awareness lessons who unfortunately were not part of their school teams. This allowed them to carry on their cricket development outside of school. First Smash is the very start of grass roots cricket in Horowhenua Kapiti and continues to be a great introductory product which focuses on FUN.



3.0 Superstar School Programme – Sport Manawatu

Our Superstar Cricket Programme continues to grow for its fifth year in a row in partnership with Sport Manawatu. This season we had 15 schools take part in 9 months of the year each entering a team in both year 3/4, year 5/6 grades. We continue to reach as far along our region as possible and were lucky enough to venture from Opiki all the through to Raumati South. We started delivery Term 3 again this season with the

plan to run through till the end of term 1. Unfortunately, we were cut short halfway through the tournament due to COVID-19.

This programme is broken up into 3 main components.

- Awareness Lessons
- Development Lessons
- Tournaments

Throughout Term 3 we delivered one off awareness lessons to all year 1 and 2 students with any new schools receiving lessons



for the whole school. In total we delivered over 50 awareness sessions across Horowhenua Kapiti covering over 800 year 1 and 2 students.

Once the awareness sessions were done and dusted term 4 rolled around and the schools put forward students to take part in the School Cricket Programme. This year we broke up the development/skill lessons into two blokes. 6 one-hour lessons were delivered during term 4 and another 2 one-hour lessons were delivered term 1. In total each school received 8 development/skill lessons to prepare for the term 1 tournament to see out the program. 20 players from each school took part in every lesson where we split teams up in two squads of 10 players for our Year 3&4 and Year 5&6 teams. Over 400 children across HK received eight development lessons and plenty of games during our Term 1 tournament. All participants also received a H-K Cubs Cricket set to keep and practice at home.



Term 1 meant tournament time again. We had planned for the tournament

to run for 6 weeks. For the third year running, our school programme had a compulsory girl only component to it where 40% of all teams were to be female players. Devastatingly the tournament was cut short due to COVID-19 and teams were crowned winners on points. We also had set to hold girls only festival days where school girls from all over H-K came to play against each other. We had over 100 females from both Horowhenua and Kapiti due to participated but was forced to be put off.

4.0 Girls Super 8 Cricket Programme – Sport Wellington

This year was the first every year we have run a Female Super8s program in partnership with Sport Wellington. This program took place in Kapiti with both local colleges involved along with 6 intermediate schools. This programs aim was to attract new female participants into cricket. Sessions were designed to meet the girls needs and target audience. We started delivery term 3 2019 and run all the way through term 1 2020. Unfortunately, term 1 was cut a little short due to COVID-19.

This program is broken up into 3 main components.

- Awareness Lessons
- Development Lessons
- Tournaments



Throughout term 3 each school that took part in the program received a number of awareness sessions delivered to all year 7,8,9, and 10 Girls. We had Paraparaumu and Kapiti college, Paraparaumu Beach, Paraparaumu, Raumati South, Waikanae, Our Lady of Kapiti and KenaKena School take part. In total we delivered over 30 awareness sessions across all schools with an amazing result of including over 429 girls.

Term 4 rolled around and a 150 Girls who took part in the awareness session decided to continue and take part in development lessons and then go on to join in on the festival days. Schools received weekly 1-hour development lessons twice a week throughout term 4 and 1. In total 75 development sessions were delivered with each intermediate school receiving a minimum of 8 sessions and college a minimum 6 sessions. Term 1 rolled around, and the festival days started. Each school entered teams of 10 with some entering multiple teams. Weather played its part in a couple days and COVID-19 cut us



short. We were lucky enough to finish the program of with a fantastic festival day at Kena Kena Park where Paraparaumu Beach were crowned the first ever winners of the first ever Female Super8s programme.



5.0 Yeah! GIRLS

Yeah!GIRLS is a program that is now run nationwide all-over New Zealand. For a first time every it made its debut in 2020 in the Horowhenua. This program had aimed to deliver cricket in a girl-friendly way through a model focusing on two inter-related strategies of recruitment and retention of 10-16-year-old girls along with the main motivators of friends, fun, and staying active. This



program was delivered during terms 4, 1, and was broken up into age groups and hubs. Donnelly Park was the hub for all intermediate aged girls. Horowhenua and Waiopehu each had their own hubs at their college also.

Program broken up into 3 main components.

- Promotion
- Delivery
- Hubs, Donnelly Park Year 7&8, Waiopehu College Years 9,10,11, and Horowhenua College Years 9,10,11

Term 4 saw the bulk of the promotion take place. Social Media advertising, handing out flyers and posters throughout the local schools across Horowhenua and delivering taster sessions. We went into 4 intermediate aged schools weekly promoting and trying to get as many girls as we can. Term 1 2020 rolled round, and it was time to start delivering at our hubs. The Donnelly Park hub was a huge success, the girls turn up each week for an hour session and had a blast. Music playing on the



speaker, water balloons and sponges were being tossed, hit and caught. Each girl that took part in the program received head bands and bracelets and the couple lucky girls were gifted a hoodie each. COVID-19 got in the way of the college hubs but can guarantee we will be back for round 2.







HKCA's Indoor Cricket started last winter and it was a huge success. This indoor competition is also a great way for people to stay connected with the sport over the Winter months. We had 6 teams enter this season and everyone had great fun. The modified indoor rules meant all games were fast paced, time saving and kept you on your toes. We managed to get some old retired players back playing again which is great for the region as well as some of the young lads keeping up their cricket skills despite it being winter.

This indoor cricket season also saw the debut of primary school year 5/6 league. Four teams entered this season showing it was a great initiative to get up and running. Boys and girls from Koputaroa, Ohau, Levin East and Fairfield School turned up weekly for 5-week tournament, all enjoyed it and loved playing a different style of cricket. This junior space is in good stead and is



looking highly likely to overtake the adult league and grow to an 8-team indoor cricket tournament.

This year is the third year now that we have run our Female College Supr8's. This was a Kapiti local battle between Kapiti and Paraparaumu College as the other colleges could not produce a team. A 4-game series took place in term 4 and term 1. The cricket displayed in these games leaves the girls space in a good place. With our new female program with Sport Wellington I am excited to see this space grow in the near future.

Horowhenua and Waiopehu College competed in T20 fixtures with the winner again going on to represent our region in the Ross Taylor T20 competition. Horowhenua College went on to represent our region in this competition. Kapiti and Paraparaumu College went head to head for the Gillette Cup qualifier. It was a close battle but once again Kapiti College proved to strong and went on the represent our region. Unfortunately, that's where it ended as all cricket was called of due to COVID-19. There is a lot of good things happening in our colleges for such a small region and it is something moving forward we must continue to develop and invest time in as there are a lot of promising players coming through the ranks.

8.0 Female Cricket

Horowhenua Kapiti female development space continues to grow with the addition of our Superstar Cricket Programme. During the off season we continue to keep a minimum of 40% of all school cricketers must be female. The main reason behind this is that we believe within the next couple of years we will start seeing these females join into our cubs' cricket. Our newly Female Super8's programme in the intermediate college space will help development our female college cricket and within a few years I can see this space taking over. We also produced two female representative sides this year and acts as a good as to get building off.









What a day! On Friday 15th November 2019 HK hosted Central District Hinds Vs Otago Sparks in a weekend event held down at Donnelly Park. Through communication with Central Districts, we managed to have available 4 of the Hinds girls for a couple of hours to go into some schools and run some lessons. Levin School and Fairfield school were the lucky schools that took part in the day. The sessions went as well as we had hoped for and the Hinds were fantastic in the way they interacted with the teachers and schools.

Later, in the evening we had the entire Hinds team come along to Donnelly Park as girls from Horowhenua Kapiti and Manawatu come along to meet and interact with the Hinds. We had our new local mayor Brendon Warden attend the event and address the hinds, thanks them for coming along and wished them all the best. From here we had the hinds split up into groups of 4 and run little game stations with a HK staff member at each station. All the girls went around each station playing



with and against the hinds in same friendly banter before all coming outside and finishing of with multiple games of non-stop cricket.

From here we hosted a dinner for the girls and Hinds who came along. A question and answer session were held by Monique were the girls had the opportunity to ask the Hinds anything and some quality banter was given. Overall, this would have to be up there for my favorite day of the year. They way the Hinds interacted with the girls, schools, and parents was awesome to see!







Cubs cricket third consecutive appearance was yet another successful season. We had over cubs teams take the field in this seasons competition which is a fantastic result.

This seasons club and school teams fell just short of last years all time high by 6 with 61 club and school teams playing and training weekly throughout the summer. The graph below shows the amazing growth were had over the past years and the period of consolidation that is beginning to form its place. This is our second consecutive year we have had over 60 club and school teams that continue and I believe if we can keep this number over 60 for the next years to come to act this will help immensely keep our pathway for our junior

cricketers in top form.



Cubs Cricket will be the future of HKCA. I strongly believe that in 10-15 years' time, our senior competition will be stronger than it is now if we keep our Cubs competition going. More games, more qualified coaches providing good coaching is only going to benefit HKCA in the long run.





This season, NZC set all districts a series of KPI's to fulfil for the 2019/20 season. A huge amount of effort and time was put into coach development, recruitment, and data collection. Everyone who coaches a team within

the Horowhenua-Kapiti required to register through NZC's coaching framework whether old or new and then complete their online learning modules. During Term 4, I ran clinic in both Kapiti and Levin along with Central Districts Nigel Brooke to get all our coaches registered and complete a practical coaching course. This including setting a profile up, understanding the framework and running them through their online learning modules. From there everyone was police vetted and set on their way to do their online modules from the luxury of their own home.



In total this season we have managed to get 45 coaches registered and fully completed. This may seem like a simple thing to do but relying on our lovely coaches and volunteers to complete online modules was tough and getting them to attend the practical session had its challengers. With all these people now having done the groundwork all our members will benefit and we are lucky to have so many willing parents dedicate their time to our sport.

11.0 Volunteers

Horowhenua Kapiti despite being one of the smaller regions within CD, continue to be blessed with volunteers willing to step up and offer their services in a variety of different voluntary roles. These volunteers range from school coaches & managers to umpires, scorers, rep coaches & managers to administrators. Over the years HKCA have identified for that in order to recruit and retain our volunteers we must look after them. In the past years we have been fortunate enough to take them to Blackcaps games and reward them for all the effort they give us. We also like to reward these people at prizegiving but COVID-19 unfortunately prevent these events happening. I can say our volunteers don't go unnoticed and we find ways to recognise and reward these people best we can. We are once again extremely lucky to have amazing volunteers helping us provide as many fun participation opportunities for everyone in HK, without them we couldn't achieve the amount we do.

HK Cubs Junior Cricket

The past season has seen continued growth in junior cricket numbers in HKCA. We continue to run our three grades on Friday nights and Saturday mornings, with 30 teams competing across the three competitions.

All teams are club run with all our senior clubs independently running their own space, HK continues to run the registration days however with the clubs help, this allows us to promote an even spread of playing numbers throughout the region. Each club provides its own junior coordinator to the HK Junior Committee; it would be impossible to run



Cubs Cricket without these people, they do all the hard graft organising coaches, managers, selecting teams, and weekly comms with all the above, we greatly appreciate their efforts!

The KOBCC Panthers took out the T24 Yr8 competition, beating the PCC Scorchers in the final. HKCA provided a BBQ and drinks at the PCC v Marist Coastal Challenge match in December for the three teams that were finishing their Cubs careers and moving on Secondary school, we wish them well.

KOBCC Pumas took out the post Xmas T24 competition and our T20 champions were the PCC Renegades who were promoted to T24 post Xmas also.

HK Cubs Junior cricket has continued to grow from strength to strength this season with nearly 380 children from across our communities playing organised cricket under our umbrella last year. They played in 33 separate teams across three grades, representing each of our 5 senior clubs. In our competitive grades, the KOBCC Panthers won our Premier T24 Super Smash grade losing only one match across the season. The OSC Lynx took out the T20 Smash grade for the second season going unbeaten all year. We continue to review and evolve the formats and make up of these competitions to ensure we are giving our children a quality experience and best environment to grow as young cricketers.

The Three southern clubs have taken the responsibility of providing junior cricket in their areas again after a very long absence. This is a fantastic positive of our association. It gives our young cricketers a place to call their cricket home, where they will have easier access to all the support they need to grow in our game; it will overtime also give our clubs the opportunity to build strong ties with those juniors so they continue to play as senior cricketers.

The time and effort the volunteers from all our senior clubs have put in for our youth has been outstanding and the major reason for the success and continued growth in our junior space. Thank you also to all the Junior Club Convenors who are the key in keeping all things moving in the right direction.

Tournament Hosting

HK again was privileged to host the CDU15 annual tournament from the 19th – 23rd of January. All eight teams were hosted at Tatum Park and played a mixture of 50 over and T20 matches at all four of our senior club grounds. Manawatu took ouT the title this year remaining unbeaten throughout the weeks cricket. The representatives from all the other districts were happy with the way the tournament ran and their universally positive feedback especially around the standard of our facilities and the quality of cricket community was especially great to hear. With all the interruption and uncertainty around the COVID impact on our financial year I am very please to say we have produced another favourable result. Our Financial year ends on May 31st so it was a tough period for us from February navigating the impact to our revenue streams.

In essence, the successful groundwork conducted in the first half of the financial year allowed us to weather the Storm to still produce a positive result.


The audited financial accounts show that HKCA has recorded a profit of \$50k for the year ending 31st May 2020. This is now the fifth consecutive year we have achieved a positive return.

Total income was the same as last financial year at \$433k, Grant funding was slightly down but revenue from Hosting was increased.

Expenses were up on last year by 5% and this is partly attributed the increased Hosting we did this Season with being back on the National Circuit.

Forecasting into the next financial year is unsurprisingly difficult, impact to our major revenue stream of Class 4
Funding in the first six months is expected and the unknown level of Govt Support makes it challenging. However, I am pleased to say that the Board at HK have made it aware they want our products and services we have provided in the past to continue, into the foreseeable future. This allows for our operational team to continue to plan with delivering all the projects and programmes in place. This approach may have a short-term impact on us financially and reserves may be called upon later in the year if required.

The Financial Committee has decided not to move any additional funds achieved this financial year into our Reserves so currently our total amount of reserves remains at \$150,000.
