

Our region has an engaged, highly capable and committed Governance Team. Warm thanks to Shaun Tyson who retired at the start of the Year. Shaun gave our region many years of quality service and leadership, Shaun was instrumental in bringing our new Constitution to life a big project we are grateful he led. Todd Isaacs our Chair has been a huge support the last 12 months along with all our Governance Team.

Our delivery team was well led by Chad Law this season, continued focus on growing the base through quality participation, development and pathway opportunities was achieved. Over 5,000 participants this Season had engagements through Our First Smash Programme, Smash Play Primary School Initiatives, Kookaburra Cubs Cricket, Winter Coaching Programmes, Yeah Girls, Development and Representative opportunities, Club Cricket, Festival Days and Women and Girls initiatives. A vast range of products catering for all.

Our hardworking team saw us once again meet all our requirements outlined in the Network Partnership Agreement we signed with NZ Cricket and Central Districts. We are proud to continue to hold a 100% achievement rate with NZ Cricket since the inception of these agreements in 2018. I would like to at this point make a special thank you to Nigel Brooke who retired recently. Nigel has been a pillar of support to us at the District Levels for what feels like a lifetime. He will be extremely hard to replace, and I know our team will miss his involvement.

From a National perspective NZ Cricket have made groundbreaking changes within the Female space with equality across many facets in the professional arena. Aspirational young women now have a real career pathway within our game. Increased community investment has been committed however from my experience to date what arrives at the true grassroots can be somewhat insignificant when measured against what may have been intended.

Our Game this Season remained in good shape with growth across some Clubs. For the second year in a row both Levin Old Boys took out the Coastal Challenge Cup and Kapiti Old Boys retained the prestigious



Hall Shield. An increase in numbers across the Development and Pathway space was proudly achieved, our philosophy switch to Development vs Representative continues to create opportunities for more.

Our HK Senior Men Team finished a more than respectable fourth behind the BIG 3 in the Furlong Cup Competition and were competitive in every game at Chapple Cup. The team once again was well led by Andrew Simpson and we have seen a new crop of younger talent given opportunities this season, which can only be good for the future of the Bears.

I would also like to acknowledge the tireless number of hours our growing volunteer base puts into making HKCA a better place. We have an amazing group of people willing to step up and help us achieve more. Your energy and effort is appreciated.

Our strong financial positioning has been maintained this year and we have produced a slightly better than forecasted result.

I am extremely satisfied with the progress we continue to make both on and off the park.

High Performance and Pathway Report 2022-23

Chad Law

The season of 2022/23 was yet another highly successful one for the Horowhenua Kapiti Cricket Association. Our Pathway space is an inspiring space to work in as we seek to continue closing the gap

behind what people would consider to be the powerhouses in Central Districts. This provided a lot of imputes for our HK Senior Men's and Pathway Pre-Season Programmes whilst again our Future Bears Winter Programme was a huge success with record numbers and outstanding engagement from our cricketing community.

Our Junior Pathway space continues to have a brilliant side for them to look up to and aspire to representing. Our HKCA HMC Senior Men's Team is showing that they are capable of being that team, leading from the front with a solid season to finish 4th behind Hawkes Bay,



Manawatu and Taranaki. This side is growing its supporter base locally and further afield through the way it goes about its cricket and are a big part of our movement towards being a respected opposition throughout our age grades as well as being admired for the way in which we go about our business. We believe that the growth at the top will filter back down to our Year 6's and up again as we seek to inspire our players both male and female to want to represent their region at the highest level and beyond.

HKCA continue to support whole heartedly NZC's directive to ensure police vetted and qualified coaches are operating in our game. This lines up with one of our key strategies regarding the upskilling of our



regions aspiring coaches. We have been able to increase our coaching numbers and provide both interested parents and prospective coaches with access to training, qualifications, and resources. We remain committed to this cause, even more so given the renewed emphasis placed upon it and we can expect not only an increase in the number of coaches within our region but also in the quality of these coaches. They will have achieved qualifications and passed police vetting to ensure both a safe



environment and a quality one in terms of the participant's ongoing progression. As can be seen Coach Development continues to be a significant area moving forward and rightly so given the significance of these people in the growth of our participants. NZ Cricket has been able to employ specific people in Coach Developer roles in NZ to continue the informal Coach Development work done by Coaches and Coordinators who wear various hats in the roles for their respective Associations. By being able to formalize this work whilst providing ongoing support and mentoring for Coach Developers they have established a model which will hopefully be sustainable and should see the quality in our Coaches grow. Our coaches and volunteers were recognized at our prizegiving for their contribution to coaching, management and facilitation of our game and are the finest examples of the calibre of people we have within our region.

A considerable amount of work was put in last Winter in the form of a User Pays Winter Programme and Pathway Squad Pre Season Programmes. This allowed for skill specific technical work whilst also allowing for a broad approach in terms of addressing the many things that can contribute to a young persons growth and development personally and as cricketers. Amongst these things were a focus on Strength and Conditioning, Goal Setting, Mental Strength, Tactics, Team Building and Culture. Something which exemplified our ongoing growth was the squad sizes that we carried through our Pathway Pre-Season Programme where in some cases we had up to 19 players attending training. Our philosophy here is ensuring that we are not operating exclusively and that we are providing equal opportunity to those players that may not be in the "top 10" but have potential and would benefit from ongoing coaching. This ensures that we can build crucial depth and has seen us field development teams for various fixtures whilst growing our number of Junior Rep teams. This year we sent a Year 9/U14 Team to Riverbend again having first done so last year whilst we were able to field 2 teams in our Year 7 space. 2 teams in our Year 7 space clearly bodes very well for the future as we anticipate these players moving through the grades. This is something we are proud of and plan on continuing in alignment with a philosophy based on opportunity for those with a desire to learn and improve. Of course, it increases the need for resource with coaching/management, uniforms, tournament costs and the likes however we believe that it is of utmost importance to ensure that our programs and systems are accessible to anyone that is keen and has the right attitude. We know the research shows that the times of focusing our energies on the upper echelon



of youth sporting groups are gone to be replaced with a more holistic and inclusive approach that remove's some of the many barriers that have been in place and provides maximum opportunity for development. Our goal remains in place to have a Senior Women's team which would complete the local Association Pathway for our aspiring female cricketers whilst helping them on their way to selection for the Central Hinds and ultimately the White Ferns. Having said this we can also see that considerable energy needs to be poured into growing the base to ensure we have a sustainable



number of female cricketers participating. The Mens Emerging Players is a space we continue to work to establish, providing a crucial link in the pathway from U17's to Senior Representative Cricket. Whilst not quite at the point of having a team here we have worked to improve this space by making Senior Rep Squad trainings available to these players to ensure they are part of the environment and getting access to coaching and training opportunities

Our philosophy is a hollistic view where we aim to develop a good person first and foremost in the knowledge that this will help them in life whilst also developing a good cricketer. We understand how important it is to know our role in our players lives and that role is often as a mentor, support person and supporter- we just so happen to be coaching them cricket as well. This philosophy has seen our coaches work to understand each player as best as possible so as to be able to facilitate their development on and off the field in a way that is best suited to them. In line with this we are also working hard to help our cricketers understand that their identity stretches far beyond that of being just a cricketer. We encourage them to play different sports, devote energy to the relationships with people in their lives, take part time jobs if appropriate, have hobbies, value school and have an eye towards future occupations outside of sport. We know how hard it is for young people to do this but we believe it is crucial especially when there are the inevitable pitfalls and setbacks throughout the course of their journey.

In a time where many clubs and Associations were foregoing formal prizegiving functions we were very proud to be able to press ahead with our own prizegiving evening. These evenings are big pieces of work and can stretch on but we don't apologise for this as it is the one time each year we can all get together to celebrate our volunteers, our region, our people and our achievements. Something we were able to celebrate this year which was new was the achievements of 4 of our young men who gained recognition at a higher level. Bailey Te Tomo, Zack Benton, Jamie Marshall and Taine Halbert were all selected for CD Maori to attend New Zealands National Maori Tournament where Bailey and Zack were selected in the Tournament Team. Bailey and Zack were also selected for CD A in their fixture Vs Wellington A. This will have a significant impact in terms of reinforcing what we know and believe which is that you can make it from Horowhenua Kapiti. For our cricketers runs and wickets are their currency and we want them to trust that should they perform they will be recognised accordingly.

As with most sporting organizations, whilst performances and success on the field are both visible and memorable, it is important to remember the significant governance, direction and leadership required behind the scenes to support the objectives for cricket both in our region and nationally. Our district continues to be very fortunate to have a Board and Staff that provide the skills, experience, passion, and knowledge to ensure the many challenges facing cricket are effectively met. Our latest Future Bears Winter Training Programme is under way with unprecedented number's including many new faces and we excitedly anticipate next season whilst confidently predicting that Horowhenua Kapiti will continue to produce male and female cricketers capable of proudly representing not only their association but also moving into district level and beyond. Most importantly we foresee them doing this in a manner that themselves, their family and Horowhenua Kapiti Cricket can be proud of whilst developing skills that will not only be of benefit to their cricket but also stand them in good stead for their journey in life.

BEARS JUST FALL SHORT VS TARANAKI- Furlong Cup

Similar to last season's fixture Andrew Simpson won the toss and elected to bowl first in what looked to be bowler friendly conditions. The Taranaki openers started well with the dangerous Dean Robinson starting to solidify himself at the crease. However, the HK bowlers were always looking dangerous with the ball in hand. Daemon Kennett picked up the first wicket bowling Bailey Wisnewski for 20. From there Taranaki did well to rebuild until debutant Jesse Parker picked up the big scalp of Dean Robinson for 35 and then struck

twice more getting Kurt Leuhart and Josh Borrell. The Bears had got their hard-earned breakthrough and continued

to pile the pressure on the Taranaki middle order as they picked up two more wickets cheaply courtesy of Zack Benton and a sharp run out from Daemon Kennett. Just when it looked like the Bears were on top and looking like bowling Taranaki out, Taranaki battled back into the game thanks to some valuable contributions from their lower order. The Bears kept battling and managed to pick up a bowling bonus point with 9 wickets before Taranaki declared at 299-9. Huge credit must go to Zack Benton who bowled 29 overs in the first innings, nearly a third of the total overs.

After some overnight rain play on day 2 looked like it could be interesting, as the Bears looked to chase down 300 for first innings points. Andrew Simpson came to the crease and again to looked to be positive. Simpson was looking in good touch making 28 including 6 4's before he lost his wicket. From there Taranaki continued to pile

With 300 now looking beyond reach the pair still looked to be positive and score as Andrews made 21 from 45 and Parker made 18 from 35 including one maximum. Shortly after Andrews and Parker were dismissed, the Bears were bowled out for 172 in 50 overs.

BEARS PUT UP VALIANT EFFORT VS STRONG MANAWATU- Furlong Cup

The HK Bears put up a strong effort against a strong Manawatu side on the weekend, a heavily rain affected fixture. Manawatu won the toss and elected to put HK into bat on a green top. Openers Matty Wilson and Prabodha Arthavidu started the innings off strong playing with positive intent. Matty Wilson looked to be in for a good one targeting the Manawatu opening bowlers until he was dismissed by Carlos Jensen. After losing captain Andrew Simpson very shortly after Blake de Burgh and Prabodha Arthavidu looked to

steady the ship taking their time and weathering a good period of bowling. Shortly after, Artha was dismissed for 38. Locky Spring then came to the crease and started his innings positively with a flick off the legs for 6. From there Spring and de Burgh continued to battle on and target any loose bowling. From there the Manawatu attack took over and bowled some tight lines picking up wickets in quick succession to bowl the Bears out for 141.

In the second innings the Bears knew they would have to bowl well and take early wickets to have a shot at first innings points with 26 overs left on day 1. Right from the first ball openers Zack Benton and Carter Andrews did what they do best, putting batsmen under extreme pressure. Benton picked up Brynn Cleaver cheaply and Andrews claimed the big scalp of ex Stag Mason Hughes. From there Benton and Dawson put new batsmen Maara Ave and Mitch Renwick under some extreme pressure drawing out numerous false shots and plays and misses. Additionally both bowlers had close LBW shouts turned down. To the credit of Ave and Renwick they were able to see out a tricky period and finish the day with Manawatu 84-2. With a bit of overnight rain day 2 didn't kick off until 1pm. HK needed something special with the ball to have a shot in the first innings. Once again Benton and Andrews bowled a tight opening spell letting Manawatu know that





they were still alive and kicking. However from there on the Manawatu batsmen showed their class and both claimed their 50's until Dawson got the breakthrough of Ave shortly after. Manawatu chased the first innings total 3 wickets down. From there they accelerated and displayed some fine batting to reach 300 and claim maximum batting points. Manawatu declared straight away and looked to push for an outright win.

In the second dig with the bat HK had to dig deep to avoid an outright loss. However this was a chance for someone in the team to stand up and make a name for themselves against a tidy outfit. The innings did not start well for the Bears losing 4 wickets for 32 runs early on. From there Prabodha Arthavidu and Jayden Rose-Miles stood up and battled for the Bears. Both of them played with a positive mindset and reached an 83 run partnership but more importantly chewed up multiple overs. Arthavidu was dismissed shortly after for a valiant 39 (102). From there 16 year old Debutant Brayden Meikle came to the crease and played what manager Gary O'Brien claimed to be a "golden innings in tough circumstances", looking comfortable under some pretty good Manawatu bowling. At the other end Jayden Miles continued to bat positively and soon brought up a well made 50. HK frustrated Manawatu and saw out the rest of the day finishing 149-6.

build on that going into the next game against Hawkes Bay

Furlong Cup Game 3 Horowhenua Kapiti vs Hawkes Bay

TE TOMO AND BROWNE SHINE AGAINST STAR-STUDDED BAY
The HMC HKCA Senior Men's side has just returned from a big weekend against
a star-studded Hawkes Bay side which contained 4 players that have recently
played first-class cricket. On day one the Bears bowled first on what was a
typically flat pitch at Nelson Park. In the first hour, the Bears put Hawkes Bay
under some good pressure.

Opening bowlers Zack Benton and Carter Andrews were able to get the ball to swing and trouble their opening batters. After working through a tricky period the HB batters were then able to use the platform they had made, however, Jaedyn Dawson was able to prevent that by bowing out former Canterbury King Jack Boyle. From there the Bears knew they had to keep the pressure on with



the dangerous Will Clark at the crease. The Bears continued to chip away and try to grind out some wickets but to the credit of Clark and Whitley, they were both able to weather the storm and both bat through some tricky periods. Whitley was able to bring up his 50 and Clark was able to grind through to triple figures despite the Bears putting him under some extreme pressure with the ball. Will Clark was eventually dismissed for 120 by young Jesse Parker. Going from there the Bears knew that Hawkes Bay would look to accelerate their innings.

However, the Bears did well to slow it down and make life tough for the Bay bowling great lines and being consistent. Eventually, Bayley Wiggins did get away and made 69* from 63 rocks and Jono Whitley brought up his maiden ton.



With 1 session left the Bears were put into bat. They knew that having a shot at first innings points that the evening session would have to go well. Openers Bailey Te Tomo and Andrew Simpson both made solid starts and saw out the Bay opening bowlers before they were both dismissed in quick succession. That brought Matthew Wilson and Daniel Browne to the crease. Both lads showed a positive intent and looked to put pressure on the Bay bowlers. Wilson led

However the experienced Carter Andrews was able to find the breakthrough picking up Steventon LBW, and Dawson was able to claim his 4th of the innings. Going into the lunch break HK were well and truly on top and were



looking to bowl Wairarapa out cheaply. Straight after lunch Benton and Dawson were both able to pick up quick wickets leaving Wairarapa 9/119. A last-wicket partnership of 21 was able to get Wairarapa through to 140, putting the Bears in a commanding position with the best part of 2 sessions remaining. Well done to Jaedyn Dawson who claimed his first Bears 5 wicket haul.

In the second innings openers, Bailey Te Tomo and Andrew Simpson both picked up where they left off in Hawkes Bay. Both players batted aggressively and looked to put away any loose bowling that was dished up. It wasn't long before both players had reached the 50-run milestone. From there the platform was set to try and get to the 300 mark and claim maximum batting points. Te Tomo kept going in his aggressive manner hitting twelve 4's and four 6's before he was dismissed for 93, falling just short of back-to-back tons. From there Wairarapa fought back then claiming Simpson for 75 and then Matthew Wilson for 5. After losing three quick wickets the Bears needed to rebuild and that brought Prabodha Arthavidu to the crease along with Blake de Burgh. Both players did well to see off a tricky period where Wairarapa's tails were up before de Burgh was caught. This brought Daniel Browne to the crease who looked to continue his form from Hawkes Bay. Both Browne and Arthavidu batted with poise and intent as they saw out the rest of the day leaving HK 221/4.



On day two Browne and Arthavidu looked to up the anti and get HK through to the 300 mark which they did comfortably. Arthavidu also made his 3rd 50 of the season for the Bears. From there the Bears looked to accelerate and get out to a 200-run lead. This change in tempo also created chances for Wairarapa in which they took as they claimed Prabodha Arthavidu for 83 and then Spring shortly after. In came Carter Andrews who injected some big hitting making 28* off 17 balls as the Bears declared at 351/7. With a 200-run lead in the bank, the Bears had the big task of bowling Wairarapa out, ideally for less than 200. However, Wairarapa was up for the fight. Early on HK claimed their first wicket through Carter Andrews. From there Dawson claimed another one. With two wickets falling quickly youngsters Jake Jonas and Mark Steventon both battled and made it hard for HK, frustrating the bowlers. However with persistence and consistency spinner Thomas Harris was able to pick up both batters in quick succession. While Harris claimed the wickets, he bowled in a brilliant partnership with Prabodha Arthavidu who bowled tight lines and made it difficult for the batters to defend. From there captain, Andrew Simpson looked to rotate the bowling attack. This paid off as the Bears were able to claim three guick wickets to put Wairarapa in a vulnerable position, however the Wairarapa last wicket partnership batted with grit and determination to keep the Bears from gaining an outright win.




Chapple Cup Match 2 Vs Wairarapa

One of the many challenges we faced was that I only managed to get into the role in November 2022 due to visa and travel etc. Due to various circumstances we were unable to deliver some of the programs especially in schools in Term 3 and the majority of Term 4 in 2022. On the other hand, despite those challenges, we came out on top with significant numbers in many of our spaces.

First Smash

The First Smash recruitment process was done before my arrival with a few new approaches and tweaks made in the delivery process. We delivered the program aligned with the SMASH PLAY program. Like other years the program was designed for children aged 4 – 7 with little or no cricket experience and was run at Kena Kena Park in Paraparaumu and Donnelly Park in Levin. The Programme was run over a course of 10 weeks in Term 4 2021 and Term 1 2022. Overall, we had 56 children partaking in the programme with 38 in the Kapiti programme and 18 in the Levin programme. It is a 65% participation increase compared to the 2021/22 Season.











Awareness sessions

The awareness sessions were essentially a taster of what kids might experience in our development sessions and or club cricket. Each session would start with a simple warm-up game followed by some skills and then finish off with a game. At the end of each session, we would then hand out flyers for club cricket and let the year 3 - 6 know about the development sessions we would be delivering. Due to various reasons, there was a lack of delivery happen till 2023 Term 1. During Term 1 we delivered awareness lessons in 8 Schools in 75 sessions and 1530 students engaged. These sessions let us build relationships and trust with the schools and students for the upcoming season. 13 Schools are already booked for the awareness lessons for Term 3 2023.





Development Lessons for SMASH PLAY FESTIVAL

SMASH PLAY development sessions are a new way of delivering development programs than previously done. In Term 4 2022 We delivered to 9 schools and in Term 1 2023 We delivered to 3 Schools. Each school that participated in this program was given the option to enrol in three different groups of 8 children, one year 3 – 4 group, and one year 5 – 6 group. We saw an average of 2 to 3 girls per age group. We delivered 72 development sessions to engage 200 students throughout the program. Each development session focused on a different cricket skill e.g., one bowling session, one batting session, one fielding session, and finally, one modified game-based session to prepare the kids that wanted to participate in the SMASH PLAY festival at the end of term 1 in March.



SMASH PLAY festival was one of the highlights of the season and around 150 kids participated in the festival held at Donnelly Park on the 8th of March 2023. 12 Schools participated. Unfortunately the weather gods didn't help us

as we were scheduled to have 4 games per team and were only able to have 2 games due to wet weather. We have received quite a positive response from the participant schools and looking forward to doing it again in Term 1 2024.





Yeah Girls

It was a challenging season in Yeah! Girl's initiative and community hubs in 2022/23 for various reasons.

Even with those challenges we were able to deliver in 3 school hubs in Term 1 2023, a total of 50 girls engaged across the 3 hubs we delivered which were inschool. We look forward to growing this program in the 2023/24 season and use as a recruitment tool to engage Youth Female participants for non-traditional, traditional, umpiring and coaching in the beautiful game of cricket.





Leading up to the 2023/24 season we have already confirmed booking with 3 school hubs to engage in Term 4 2023 and planning to engage a minimum of 8 school hubs throughout the season.





Women and Girls

The women and girls' area is still a growing space in the Horowhenua-Kapiti Region, and we are still piloting different things to work out what works with our community to increase female participation. During the 2022 – 2023 season we hosted the YEAH GIRLS social cricket festival day at Basil Netten Indoor Centre on 22nd of April 2023.

There was 4 participants per team and it was played as modified indoor cricket 6A side format. The 2 Levin clubs were very proactive on this festival day and there was a great atmosphere throughout the day. Whilst the participation numbers were low for these events, we believe we learnt a lot in terms of what our community needs in this space. Overall HKCA are really excited about the Female area and are committed to growing these opportunities.



Secondary School Cricket

Four of the secondary schools in the region have had busy cricket seasons although the way that looked for the Kapiti based Schools differed to our Horowhenua based Schools. The Horowhenua College 1st XI and Waiopehu College 1st XI did not compete individually or as a











there is a renewed drive to regenerate Cricket within each respective School. Paraparaumu College & Kapiti College had multiple teams competing respectively in the College Sport Wellington competitions and continue to build significant depth and impressive cricketing Pathways.

Ross Taylor Bat CD Champs

The competition is a T15 contest that is a competition to cater for schools not involved in the traditional Gillette Cup. Paraparaumu College & Kapiti College took part in our own qualifying series, with the winner representing HK at the tournament. Paraparaumu College won and earnt their way through.

Paraparaumu College performed well at the CD finals with Whanganui High School finishing deserved winners.

We received good support from the HKUSA which resulted in course attendees successfully completing their Level 1 Umpires Course. Locally we now have six active Senior Umpires, a number many other areas are jealous of and we have plans in place to continue growing this number. Our local Senior Umpires are very active with many continuing to undertake personal development and making themselves

available for higher honours whilst in turn giving back to the Community offering their services at Junior Festival Days, School and Club fixtures. George Tukupua was awarded the HK Club Umpire of The Year at our Prize giving and is a great example of someone that gave up a lot of his time outside of what could normally be expected.



Our Team of Volunteers grew again this Year with multiple people from all our Clubs, Schools and Pathway System register this Season. The definition of a volunteer has certainly changed in post covid times with people time poor and acutely aware of what they give their time to. The 2022/23 was a season filled with challenges but also a season filled with some fantastic highlights.

We once again had a successful year of club cricket with our senior competition winners being shared between Levin Old Boys, Paraparaumu CC, Kapiti Old Boys, and Otaki Cricket Club. With Weraroa CC and Waikanae coming close to silverware throughout the season.

In the Coastal Challenge, it was good to see all four HKCA clubs perform well. Levin Old Boys went back to back winning the final against Whanganui United, Weraroa lost narrowly in the semi-finals and Kapiti Old Boys and

Paraparaumu CC both were within 2 points of the Semifinals.

We saw a new initiative in the Presidents grade with the introduction of the T20-Test match. The competition provided more chances for players from all teams to fully participate in the game, with the batting order in the 2nd innings having to be essentially reversed and bowlers only being able to bowl 8 overs across both innings. It is fair to say this new initiative provided a new and positive experience for our president's grade players. The HK team also successfully ran numerous interdistrict fixtures and competitions during the season. The first of which was the Central Districts Year 9/10 Tournament. Once again Tatum Park did a brilliant job in hosting all 8 teams for the 3 days.

Additionally, the efforts from our volunteers in the kitchen and around the grounds made the week run even better, as well as our ground staff for once again providing quality pitches for this tournament. In the final Hawkes Bay put up a dominant display to defeat Nelson. Our second main interdistrict event was hosting the Central Districts A

Financial Report

David O'Brien

We have completed the latest financial year with another positive result. Budgets and financials were under constant review as we looked to increase income for the year prior.

The audited financial accounts show that HKCA has recorded a profit of \$25k for the year ending 31st May 2023. This is now the eighth consecutive year we have achieved a positive return.

Total income was up 17% on last year to 492k and 105% to budget. Uplift in revenue was achieved by our increased success in Grant Funding, Improved sales revenue from User Pays Programmes like the WCP and more contributes to Seasonal Costs by having more participants.

Expenses were well controlled with a total spend of \$467k. This amount was 3% over what was budgeted. Compared to last year we saw expected increases in Gear, Equipment and Uniforms, this aligns with our increased Grant Income.

No significant Property, Plant and Equipment Assets were purchased during this Financial Year. Our Balance Sheet also shows our Total Equity increased by 25k.

Currently the Governance Team have not discussed tagging any additional funds into our Reserves this year. However I confident once discussed an amount will be decided to add to the current tagged 200k. We continue to work within our policy of growing our Reserves to cover an annual operational expense, which currently averages circa \$450k.

We have been courageous once again in our forecasting for FY24 with a desire to maintain our revenue to the same level as 23. This is bold due to the volatile nature of third-party funding however we are committed to boosting our staff resources, to balance workload and increase engagement in strategic focus areas.

I would once again like to thank Dennis Blank for his energy and expertise in conducting the Independent Auditing of our Accounts. Denis was once again complimentary of our results, systems and structures and we received an unqualified report.


